ESTATE & FOUNDATION GIFTS AMAZE SSIP LEADERS

GOVERNOR'S CUP FOUNDATION

On September 18, SSIP Food Closet received a very generous donation of \$25,000 from representatives of The Governor's Cup Foundation. David Sanders and Gavin McHugh presented a check in-person to SSIP Board Chair Tom Busch, and Food Closet Director Simon Yeh.

The Governor's Cup Foundation is a local corporation that delivers financial support for a variety of non-profits that align with the GCF's purpose. The GCF provides a forum for open discussion and the exchange of ideas on public policy, scientific and humanitarian issues. In addition to grants, the GCF also generates revenue by hosting an annual Governor's Cup Invitational Golf Tournament in Pebble Beach, CA. Andrea Noteware, an SSIP volunteer, mentioned the Food Closet to her husband who is connected with the GCF, and as a result SSIP was selected to receive this amazing gift.

On their visit to SSIP Food Closet, David and Gavin witnessed how their financial support impacts the over 250 families the Food Closet serves on average each day.

ROBERT GILL TRUST

The SSIP Board of Directors, staff and volunteers were recently overwhelmed by a substantial bequest from the Robert Gill estate. In September, a check for \$100,000 was received for the continuing operation of the Food Closet. Mr. Gill, a Dixon farmer, rancher, husband, father and community activist, believed in service above self.

During his lifetime, he was a member and leader of many business and community organizations, including the Masons, Shriners, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Solano Water District, the Dixon Bank of America Board of Directors, 4H, Future Farmers of America and Boy Scouts. His dedication in lifting up the community was based on his love of people. Mr. Gill was as well known for his backyard barbecues as for his community activism.

Prior to his death in 2014 at the age of 90, Mr. Gill set up a trust for charitable causes. One of the trustees is Phillip Chew, the son of Mr. Gill's good friend and fellow farmer, Kern Chew. *Continued on page 2*

For over two decades the SSIP Food Closet has been serving our clients a Thanksgiving "fixings" box to supplement their Thanksgiving gatherings. LETTER OF LOVE FOR SSIP



This is my story. My name is Debra Reeve.

I first found out about the SSIP Food Closet when I needed them. I was embarrassed to go there and in my mind, ashamed that I needed help. The person at the check-in table (Jacquie) smiled at me and asked how I was doing that

day. She was kind, very helpful and didn't make me feel ashamed or embarrassed. There was no judgement. She just wanted to help. I was so relieved.

Being Vegan, I never complained about what I received. I kept what I could use and helped some of my neighbors who were struggling, by sharing the rest of the items. This worked out well as they couldn't get to the Food Closet because of the hours.

When I no longer needed help from The Food Closet, I wanted to do something to give back for all the food,

kindness and understanding I had received. I stopped in at closing one day, and asked Jacquie if SSIP needed more volunteers. She smiled and said YES! By the time I arrived home, I already had a message telling me what day and time to arrive! I was so surprised and pleased. I showed up at that day and time, met with Simon, and began bagging produce after Simon gave me a brief walk-through. I was so proud that I was able to give back. However, I didn't expect how it would change me.

During the pandemic and long after, I was pretty shut down. I would no longer go on walks by myself and had most of my food and supplies delivered. I was becoming a shut-in, and getting more depressed by the day. But volunteering helped me break down the walls that seemed to be enclosing me. I started smiling and socializing again, not so afraid to go places or visit friends. Volunteering at the SSIP Food Closet did this for me, and it shocked me. I wanted to give back and help others, but the Food Closet helped me more than I could have ever imagined.

Thank you, SSIP Food Closet, for giving me renewed purpose and strength in my life.

Note: Debra recently moved out-of-state to be closer to her family. She says she will miss everyone and will find another volunteer opportunity in her home town. "But whatever place I choose, it will never have quite the same meaning as the Food Closet."
